Ted Quick was a True Blue Aussie. He spent most of his life farming a lovely piece of bottom-land near Donnybrook in Western Australia. He was a veteran of World War II and served gallantly in New Guinea. They say one of the few times anyone ever saw Ted with a tear in his eye was when he thought of the mates he lost in that war.

Later, Ted and his wife Betty raised a family---his son Gary still works the farm today---and though there is nowhere on earth where the sun shines brighter than Western Australia, it dimmed a bit when Ted died, just a couple years ago.
